
Discover Dulwich and its surrounding areas by walking from North Dulwich Station, through the heart of Dulwich Village and south towards Sydenham Hill. Stop and find out about the many interesting sites which are detailed at five history panels along the way.

The walk takes you past buildings established in 1619 by leading actor Edward Alleyn who purchased the Manor of Dulwich and created a charitable foundation.



1. North Dulwich

Location: North Dulwich Station



North Dulwich Station

Grade II listed building by Charles Barry Junior, built in 1866

Red Post Hill

Replica red sign post giving the road its name.

Stone road sign marks 4.5 miles from the City of London.

Railway bridge

Victorian bridge bearing the arms and initials of Alleyn's College and of the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway company.

Lincoln House

Arts and crafts house built in 1902

2. Dulwich Village

Location: 47 Dulwich Village



The Crown and Greyhound Landmark local pub known locally as 'The Dog', was built in 1898. :hecrownandgreyhound.co.uk

Herne Hill Velodrome

Still in popular use the oldest cycling track in the world. the Herne Hill Velodrome on Burbage Road hosted the 1948 Olympics, still in use today. hernehillvelodrome.com

St Barnabas Church Former Victorian church with modern glass spire established in 1892

The Old Burial Ground 35 of 42 local victims of the Great Plague of 1665

are buried here

Dulwich Park

The park was designed by Thomas Blashill and Lt Col J Sexby, for the Metropolitan Board of Works and opened in 1890. It has a café, tennis courts, boating lake, playground and bike hire. friendsofdulwichpark.org.uk

3. The Old College

Location: Roundabout on Dulwich Village



The Old Grammar School and Village Orchard

The school was designed by Sir Charles Barry in 1842. The Village Orchard was created by The Dulwich Estate in the school's old playing field and opened in 2019 to celebrate 400 years. thedulwichestate.org.uk

Christ's Chapel

Consecrated in 1616, the Chapel formed part of the original complex of Foundation buildings

Dr Webster's Fountain

Victorian water fountain marking 5 miles to London

Dulwich Picture Gallery

Oldest public art gallery in England designed by Sir John Soane in 1814. It has a café and runs a variety of workshops. dulwichpicturegallery.org.uk

Edward Alleyn House

Part of the original foundation building, now the site of the Dulwich Almshouse with 16 sheltered apartments. dulwichalmshousecharity.org.uk

4. Dulwich Common

Location: North East corner of College Road and Dulwich Common



Bell House

Georgian house, now home to an educational charity which offers support beyond the mainstream school curriculum bellhouse.co.uk

Dulwich College Grade II* listed buildings designed by Charles Barry Junior in 1870, son of the architect of the Palace of Westminster dulwich.org.uk

Tappen House Designed by George

Tappen in the early 19th Century, this building was once a base for **Dutch resistance agents**

Mill Pond

Once the site of a 16th century clay tile kiln, now home to wildlife and a picturesque row of early 18th century cottages called Pond Cottages
